Teachers in Episcopal Schools for Freedmen, 1865-1877

Compiled by Mary Sudman Donovan

To compile this list, I searched through issues of <u>The Spirit of Missions</u> from 1867 through 1874 [identified in source as Spirit] for names of teachers working with the freedmen. I added teachers listed in the <u>Protestant Episcopal Almanac & Church Directory</u>, (New York: T. Whittaker, 1875 & 1876) [identified here as Episcopal Almanac].

The teachers are listed here in alphabetical order. In most cases, the information about them has been paraphrased. Clergy who taught in these schools are available on another list.

My friend assures me, from her own observation, that I will not find much ruble in gathering up for a large day-school, the greatest difficulty is in obtaining a building. But as the need of an evening school was paramount, for those who work during the day, Captain B+++ offered the use of his large room, already warmed, and a box of school books. I procured lamps, and opened a school there last evening with fifty-four scholars . . . which we consider a decided success. There is evidently plenty of material for a large evening school."

Spirit 1866: 228 - great pleasure in distributing the supplies you sent. Have found another room suitable for a school. Rented and hope to have it cleaned and whitewashed, the benches made ready for school by next Wed. or Thurs.

Spirit 1866: 286. school opened on March 12, smallest children form a morning school taught by Miss _____, of Brookline MA. We have about 100 pupils, half of

whom are adults. "It is sad, though interesting, to see their earnest diligence and delight when they have mastered a lesson." One class of married men has moved to the third reader.

Spirit 1867: 152, 161 - Letter to Dr.Littlejohn: 7 or 8 schools here with 18 teachers sent by different states. Distribute clothing from the barrels. "It did our hearts good, I assure you, to replace their rags with something to keep them warm. It was much past our dinner hour before we remembered that we were weary or hungry....I remained with my friend (who is living by herself, supplying her own articles of food, and taken care of by the friends she came to serve,) til Saturday.... In the county of Brunswick, Virginia, in the very heart of "the black belt," during the latter part of the seventies and early eighties, Mrs. "Pattie" Buford, a cultivated Southern lady of refinement, gave up herself completely in ministering as an angel of mercy among the poorest of the poor of these black people, and by her wonderful devotion won the love and confidence of the Colored people of that entire region. Through her influence a young Colored man entered the Church who was destined to prove the most conspicuous constructive leader for his people of all our Colored clergy. What we need in New Berne is a church for the Colored people; they like the church; it seems to be just what they need.

They can have very good music among themselves, for they learn the church music very readily. It is a subject of much surprise among the Southern people that our school children have learned to chant and sing "The Gloria in Excelcis" as well as they do in the short time they have been learning it."

Spirit 1867:399 - started with thirty children, many were at work in the cotton fields, by second week had 120 and Miss Wendell the same number. Friends in Springfield have given small sum for church building & a plan from a man in NY. Spirit 1867: 90.

Morning and evening school. This Sunday my morning class was 35. Asks for a tablet with the Lord's Prayer, Ten Commandments and Creed on it.

Spirit 1866: 228 - 194 names registered. Last Sunday, assisted by two ladies from St. James' Church Mrs. Dashiell & Miss Williams. "Churchmen from St. Philip's have supplied the fuel needed for school. . . . Pray for us, that we may not be found wanting, when called upon to render our last account of the manner in which we have instructed them."

Spirit 1867: 399, 158 – Sunday School well attended when possible; roof of the church unsafe with snow on it. Dr. Peterkin is with us each Sun. afternoon--supplied us with a load of coal last month. wonderful description of one very studious boy, p. 242; 312-3.

Spirit 1869: 124 - In New Berne, NC, Christmas celebration with gifts from lady friends of Boston and Charlton, NY.

Catechism, and in the responses. . . we are trying to prepare a class for Baptism when the Bishop comes; we each have quite a number on our list. Several ladies have called upon us, and given us encouragement that they will assist in the Sunday school."

Wendell, one of teachers sent to Newburn "We know that you have sent us out, expecting us to be brave soldiers, and we mean to be; and; I am sure, anyone to see the distress and sufferings of these poor outcasts, which we have witnessed even in our short journeying among them, ought to be willing to bear a great deal of annoyance and deprivation for the blessed privilege of alleviating, in a measure, their distress. We met with a Miss S_____ here who has been very active during three years of the war in nursing the soldiers, and now devotes herself entirely to the freedmen. She went this afternoon to a wretched shanty, without windows and door, where she found a family in great misery; the mother sick, lying in a corner covered with a few rags; two children almost starved; and the youngest child lying dead in an old starch-bag, where it had been for over two days, there being no one to bury it."

Spirit 1866: 226 - two boys are reading ancient history at home, devote Fridays to religious instruction reciting the catechism, chanting, etc. sitting watching some "refractory scholars who are "kept in" for bad behavior." Dread of smallpox has kept children at home but they are coming back now." None but an eye-witness can full appreciate the great necessity there is for active and untiring labor among these people. Just arising from a state of degradation and bondage, the spirits of many are so crushed and broken as to need wise and gentle teaching, and earnest efforts to awaken ambition in their almost stultified souls; but there are others whose eagerness to learn seems almost incredible. One old woman, of sixty years, in the evening school, carries her primer with her about her daily work.

Spirit 1866: 342 - need clothing and shaker bonnets for women class of baptism and confirmation, small pox is still a problem – Mr. Tucker's wife died on Friday and he is very sick – house is next door to our schoolhouse.
